

Mixed recycling now includes:

PAPER PRODUCTS

- corrugated cardboard & paper boxes large or multiple pieces should be flattened and/or cut
- shredded paper in a paper bag, secured with a staple
- aseptic boxes juice, soup & soy milk
- hard cover books up to 40 lbs.

GLASS BOTTLES & JARS

ALUMINUM & METAL

- aerosol cans (empty)
- scrap pieces up to 40 lbs.

PLASTICS LABELED 1.

 plastic bags - Protect the environment by avoiding single-use bags. Reuse them when possible. When recycling multiple bags, stuff one bag full of the others; tie off the full bag before placing in the recycling.

E-WASTE PERIPHERALS

 computer mice, keyboards & desktop speakers - Please remove batteries from e-waste and dispose of them through our regular weekly service.

NO GARBAGE OR ORGANICS NO FOOD-SOILED PAPER OR PIZZA BOXES NO STYROFOAM



Donate for a good cause!

During the first week of every quarter (January, April, July, October), gently used clothing will be collected and donated to a local charity. Clothing should be placed in a tightly tied clear bag next to the recycling cart.

What Goes in the Organics?

FOOD SCRAPS

- fruits & vegetables
- bread & pasta
- egg shells
- dairy products
- coffee grounds
- meat & bones


FOOD-SOILED PAPER

- napkins
- coffee filters
- tea bags
- paper towels
- pizza boxes
- newspaper
- paper bags
- paper take out boxes
- wooden chopsticks
- waxed paper boxes

NO GLASS, METAL, STYROFOAM OR PLASTIC NO JUICE, SOUP OR MILK BOXES NO DIRT, ROCK, CONCRETE OR BRICK NO LIQUID FAT, OIL OR GREASE



- flowers
- leaves
- grass clippings
- small branches less than 6" in diameter





If you don't already have a food scrap collection method that works in your

kitchen, you'll want to give your new pail a try. It can easily be stored under the sink or on your counter and it's big enough to hold all the food scraps generated by an average family in one day. Using the pail is not mandatory. If it doesn't work in your kitchen, consider using it for another purpose or dropping it off at our office.



What Goes in the Garbage?

NON-RECYCLABLE GLASS

- ceramics
- lightbulbs (no fluorescent)
- mirrors, tempered & window glass

NON-RECYCLABLE PAPER

- carbon paper
- laminated items
- metallic wrapping paper
- paper used for cleaning (soiled)
- photographs
- vacuum bags

PLASTICS NOT MARKED WITH 1-1

- 6-pack rings (please cut)
- plastic film & wrap
- plastic plates & utensils
- plastic drinking straws & stir sticks
- records, tapes & CDs
- shower curtain liners
- tape (duct, scotch, masking)

TEXTILES

- cotton balls (soiled)
- rugs & mats
- shoes, clothing & stuffed animals (that cannot be donated)
- sponges

OTHER

- balloons (latex & mylar)
- clothes hangers
- diapers
- feminine products
- foam & styrofoam
- hose (garden or rubber)
- pet feces (bagged)
- rubber bands
- toothpaste tubes
- toys (that cannot be donated)
- wood (treated)

More to Offer: Curbside collection of motor oil/filters, household batteries and cell phones!



Motor oil should be contained in one-gallon jugs that are clearly marked and tightly sealed. Filters should be placed inside a clear zipper-lock bag. Contact us to arrange for free delivery of oil jugs & filter bags. We will collect 1-gallon of oil and one filter per household each week and will leave a replacement jug and filter bag behind.

Household batteries (for example A, AA, AAA, C, D, 9-volt, rechargeable, camera, watch, hearing aid & clock batteries) should be placed inside a clear zipper-lock bag and placed on top of your blue cart on collection day.

Cell phones should be placed inside a clear zipper-lock bag (separate from batteries) and placed on top of your blue cart on collection day.





HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE HAS ITS PLACE. Hazardous items like pesticides, fertilizers, pool & photo chemicals, paint/varnish, toxic cleaning products, mercury-containing items (thermometers & fluorescent lamps for example), unwanted medications, and sharps (needles, lancets) need to be taken to a hazardous waste collection facility.
